To Know Jesus And To Share His Love

Dear RMUMC,

In November, a couple came into the office seeking assistance. They brought with them their two sons so the office was crowded. The boys were an inquisitive pair, wandering around the office and picking up items while the parents and I chatted about their situation. At one point, one of the boys held up the scallop shell, which was given to me after a "Remember Your Baptism" service at my seminary. I shared with them about the baptisms I've participated in as a pastor and about that particular service. Then, he found the cross and flame cross-stitch ornament in the shell. I shared with him that the symbol of our faith is the cross of Jesus, where the Son of God died so that we would have life. Then, he found my seahorse.

It's a small, bony seahorse, gifted to me from a man at the Peruvian church that hosted our mission team from 2014. It is one of my most prized possessions because it draws me back to that trip and the people of Peru. Furthermore, the species of the seahorse has always intrigued me. When I was a young boy and first heard of these creatures, I imagined horses that enjoyed galloping on the seashore. Perhaps at Zoo Atlanta or the Chattanooga Aquarium, my family introduced me to the real seahorses. A seahorse only gets to be a few inches long and in the grand scheme of the ocean, the seahorse is insignificant. With such mammoths as the blue whale or the Great White Shark, a seahorse would never be picked early in a sea basketball draft. Because of their tininess, seahorses often lock tails and swim in pairs rather than alone. But the most interesting fact about the seahorse? The male "gives birth" to around 2,000 individual seahorses after the eggs of the female have been transferred to the male. When the time comes, he will release the baby seahorses into the underwater water world that the seahorse calls home.

As the little boy held the seahorse, he looked at wonder at this tiny creature that had found its way to my office. We talked about the seahorse and how fascinating a creature it is, as well as the mission trip to Peru and how international missions planted its mark on my life. We talked about how seahorses are like people in church, they band together as they swim through the rough seas. You carry one another in church, just like the male seahorse carries the young in his frontal sack. I was able to blend the item they had found with my faith.

Before they left, I asked them a question that I don't normally ask: "What do you hope for your life?" (Do you ever ask questions that you just don't know where they come from? This question was highly unusual for me to ask). The boy who was still eyeing the seahorse said, "I want to go to Peru and help the people there." God was at work here.

In the Bible, Simon Peter once denied Jesus 3 times. Later, he would write 1 Peter, and in it, he included these words in the book: "Always be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the hope that you have. But do this with gentleness and respect." He recognized that he had a second chance, a re-do, and with this book and the instruction it gives, he wasn't going to miss his second shot.

Friends, this period of time ahead is, outside of Easter, the best opportunity you have to share your faith. People will wonder why are we doing all this shopping/decorating/visiting/buying/gifting/chocolating/merry-making? So much of it can be stress inducing and mystifying. In the midst of it all, I'd imagine you'll have someone wondering why even do it in the first place. They'll be clutching the proverbial seahorse and asking, "Why is this here?" And you'll look them in the eye, and say, "Because Jesus came to Earth to bring hope & life."

Seahorses, scallop shells, and crosses; Christmas trees, wrapped gifts, and fudge brownies. I don't know what the item will be, but I'd imagine that whatever it is, that item will become a springboard to share the reason for the hope that is within you.
