

Ash Wednesday Service

Ash Wednesday, February 17, begins the season of Lent, a time when many Christians prepare for Easter by observing a period of fasting,

Service repentance, moderation and spiritual discipline. Although Ash Wednesday has ancient roots, it does not appear in the rituals of The United Methodist Church or our predecessor denominations until the 20th century.

Ash Wednesday emphasizes two themes: our sinfulness before God and our human mortality. The service focuses on both themes, helping us realize that both have been triumphed through the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

This year, due to the pandemic, things will look a little different. Rather than imposing ashes on your forehead as is tradition, we will be handing you a burlap square, will impose the ashes on it, and give you this item. With its rough, coarse texture, the burlap is a perfect addition to this worship service. Plus, now you may remember this night and keep the burlap with the cross always.

Also new this year, the youth will be leading the entire service. They're excited to share their gifts of worship leadership and will be a wonderful addition to the worship team. We are excited to have them serve in this vital and powerful way.

The service will be in-person and live streamed on Wednesday, February 17 at 7:00 p.m.



Dear RMUMC,

Do you dream? The type of dreams where you are racing around trying to complete a task before the time runs out? Maybe you're being chased by monsters and you've got nowhere to go? Or perhaps you're falling endlessly?

I dream, a lot. Few nights go by that I am not dreaming of something seemingly impossible. Last night, my dream included going with Emily to Washington and Lee University, where we both graduated, and watching a swim meet (something we never did while in school). At the swim meet's conclusion, we were asked to sing the alma mater and were reminded that the end of every line was "tzatziki" (something we know isn't right). That dream left me shaking my head, wondering what did I eat or why did my brain put all those things together.

In the Bible, people took dreams seriously. Joseph famously was visited by an angel in his dream, informing him that his life was about to change, and he was to marry Mary and the son she was carrying would be named Jesus. The other Joseph in the Bible was famous for his dreams, so much so that he would be called the Dreamer by his surly brothers. Jacob dreamt that he could see a ladder with angels ascending and descending on it.

We are a bit more skeptical of dreams these days. "Surely God isn't calling me to do that." "Surely God wouldn't ask me to do that." "Surely I'm not being called to go there." And when we open our eyes, we shake our heads like a soggy dog shaking off the water. "That was crazy, now let's get back to reality."

Has God placed a dream in your mind that you can't so easily shake off? One that nips at you, leading you deeper to some realer reality? Casting dreams off as the byproducts of sleep decreases the many ways God speaks to people in the Bible and can speak to us. God speaks; but His words aren't always while we are awake. I pray that the Almighty speaks into your life this Lent, and you heed His words, whether you're wide awake or only just getting there.
