Dear RMUMC,

Ants are absolutely fascinating creatures. Without any introduction, let me give you some random ant facts, from the strangely entitled website PestWorldForKids.Org:

While Ant on Ant contact does seem like something I might be interested in, my guess is that most of you couldn't care less. Tithing gets a bad wrap. Talking about tithing gets a badder wrap. It seems to be old school and not in touch with our modern culture. Wasn't that something that they did back when everyone wore ties and dresses to church? We just don't do that anymore. Tithing might also turn people off because some perceive it to be a tool to get people to give more. It can be turned into something coercive. Some may have had pastors that beat their parishioners over the head with it - "All she does is talk about money. I'm never going back."

So with the possibility that I might upset you or seem out of touch, here are my top five reasons why one should tithe, in no particular order:

- 1. It's an opportunity to talk about money with your family. If your family is like mine, we don't like to talk about money. We'll talk about humidity, hummingbirds, and Hummers more often than we will talk about money. It gets us squeamish for some reason. Maybe that's because our money points to our values. So when you tithe, it forces you to have conversations you might otherwise not have. You might ask the question, "how do I spend the other 90 percent of my money?" And thus, you might break the habit of being mum about the moolah.
- 2. It's got strong Biblical backing.
 Rather than being backed by the
 FDIC, tithing is backed by the
 LORD. "A tithe of everything from
 the land, whether grain from the soil

- or fruit from the trees, belongs to the Lord: it is holy to the Lord" says the book of Leviticus. If it's in the Bible, that's worth investigating in my book.
- 3. It makes you think about the order of spending. If we tithe first, everything else follows suit. Bills, jeans, belly button rings, Turtle Wax. They all can follow after tithing. Figuring out the order of what we give money to really matters. It reveals our hearts.
- 4. To tithe may lead into further dependence on God. When I tithe I'm saying, "here I am, I trust you!"
- 5. Tithing honors God. God receives pleasure when we give to God. This is true in all our relationships, when we give people our best, they are honored. Fathers, mothers, spouses, girlfriends, boyfriends, children, coworkers. When they are the recipients of our time and our gifts, they are blessed. Tithing works the same way with our heavenly Father.

What if in August you tried tithing? Jump in, give it a shot. Our guess is that you'll have many more reasons than just these five if you do.

Can't Pray? First rest!

Weariness can seriously hamper our attempts to pray, says Bonnie Gray, author of *Whispers of Rest*. "We are a generation who doesn't know how to express our souls to God, even though we drive ourselves exhausted, doing for Jesus." The solution, she says, is to stop and rest.

The stressed-out, despairing prophet in 1 Kings 19 is a prime example. "God knew Elijah needed physical rejuvenation first — in order to hear his gentle voice, whispering in a gentle breeze," Gray notes. Guarding against the depletion of spiritual, physical and emotional resources can improve our ability to hear God's voice, too. "When you find it's hard to pray, don't be afraid," says Gray. "You're standing at the very cusp of who God longs to connect with. The real you. Take the time to rest. You're worth it."
