On All Saints Day, we publicly remember and honor those who have passed away. Celebrated on the first Sunday in November, we have in the past lit candles, rang bells of remembrance, and called the names of those lost in the previous year as a way of honoring the impact their lives have had on us.

This year we intend to honor those that have died in the past year, remembering their impact on us.

As in the past, if there are names of persons you want to honor that have died in the past year that were not members of Rocky Mount UMC, please inform Pastor Will at will@rm-umc.org so that we can ensure they're mentioned during the service on November 6.



World War I ended on November 11, 1918, with the signing of the Armistice by the Allies and Germany. In the first Armistice Day proclamation in 1919, President Woodrow Wilson called for the nation to remember those who had died in their country's service and to make the day an opportunity for America to "show her sympathy with peace and justice in the councils of the nation."

In 1927 Congress called for the display of the U.S. flag on government buildings, and in 1938 Congress called for the observance of Armistice Day in churches and schools — again dedicating the day to the cause of world peace.

Now, we in the church give thanks for those who have dedicated their efforts towards peace by serving in the Armed Forces. On November 13, we will celebrate our veterans during the worship service. If you are a veteran, please send a picture of yourself when you were in active or reservist duty and a picture of yourself now to Lynn Meeks at music@rm-umc.org. We intend to use these pictures during the service and thank God for your willingness to serve our country.
