

To Know Jesus And To Share His Love

Dear RMUMC,

"For unto us a Child is born, unto us a Son is given." - Isaiah 9:6

As we gaze back on the year that was, and as we anticipate the year that will be, we ponder. We ponder what went well. We ponder what came crashing down. We've seen wars and heard rumors of wars in Ukraine and North Korea. We've heard of famines developing in South Sudan and Afghanistan, Somalia and Ethiopia. We've endured an ever-deepening division politically across the US. We've fallen into a deep inflationary cycle.

It has been a tough year globally and nationally.

We do some serious reflecting this time of year. And at some point, while we do that pondering, we will hear Handel's Messiah echoing through the sanctuary. The story of Handel's Messiah is well-loved. During the 1743 premiere of George Frideric Handel's Messiah, King George II stood up during the "Hallelujah" chorus, a tradition that continues today. We cannot know exactly why he stood. We can speculate. Were his legs numb from sitting for over 2 hours? Did he want to hear a particular choral singer better? Or was he, as I tend to believe, wishing to give God the Glory for the great things he hath done? Could he not stay seated as he reflected upon God sending Jesus to us?

These are some of the words of Handel's Messiah, "For unto us a Child is born, unto us a Son is given." Think on this. Unto us. The ones that make a muck of it all. The ones that can't seem to get along. The ones that are breaking up all across Methodism.

We're the ones that a Child is born to. We're the ones that a Son is given to.

Handel understood this. He saw his own insufficiency in the light of the sufficiency of Jesus. It is said that Handel had a hair-trigger temper. According to Smithsonian Magazine, Handel was furious with a fellow composer, Johann Mattheson, and called for a duel. During the duel, Mattheson stabbed Handel with a sword. Only because of a metal button on Handel's coat did Handel survive. His anger wasn't just towards composer colleagues. When practicing with a noted singer, Francesca Cuzzoni, she did not follow his every instruction. He grabbed her and even threatened to throw her out of a window. He is noted as saying, "I know well that you are a real she-devil, but I will have you know that I am Beelzebub!" He knew himself. He included these words from Isaiah because he knew who the us really was. It was him. And everyone else.

While reflecting on Handel and the human soul, I watched a video of the launch of Artemis I. This morning, it departed Earth on a journey to the Moon. As the rocket sprinted towards the Moon, I wondered yet again about this place we call home. The mountaintops - literal and figurative - that we celebrate upon. Maybe that's the solution, just leave the planet behind. Disgusted? Just disengage.

Artemis I ain't the story of the Gospel, folks. Rather than staying away, God stayed with. Rather than leaving, God came to. Rather than beating feet, God was born. To us. To you.

And to that home, unto us, a Child is born. Unto us, a Son is given. May we all stand up.
